A SUMMARY OVERVIEW OF THE PAIGNTON & BRIXHAM LOCALITY SOUTH DEVON AND TORBAY - 2013




This summary is part of the South Devon and Torbay Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) and presents a summary of the registered population within the locality of Paignton & Brixham.

Overview: The Paignton & Brixham population is generally older than the national average, with some 4% aged 85 years or older. The locality experiences noticeable levels of deprivation, especially in parts of Paignton.

The locality takes in the seaside towns of Paignton & Brixham and extends to include the surrounding rural communities such as Kingswear and Maldon.

Figure 1: Locality map




There are 11 GP practices in the locality, serving a registered population of around 72,600.

The population structure for the locality is shown in figure 2 below. The solid bars represent the locality population (by gender and 5 year age groups) and the black lines represent the England average.





Life expectancy at birth for the locality is generally similar to the CCG average (see figure 3 below). However, there is a gap of around 6 years for males, and around 3½ years for females between practices.

Figure 3: 2008-10 Life expectancy at birth by practice


2008-10 life expectancy at birth by gender for the Paignton & Brixham locality


Variations between practices within the locality are more pronounced for deprivation and benefit claimants.







Figure 5: Out of work benefit claimants







There is a noticeable difference in emergency admissions for patients living in care homes.

The crude rate, per 1,000 persons aged 65 and over living in a care home, is highest for those registered with Cherrybrook. However, with relatively small numbers, there are relatively wide confidence intervals.



Crude rate of emergency hospital admissions per 1,000 for those aged 65 and over from care homes by practice, 2010/12





Dementia is more prevalent with age. With an ageing population; we would expect the number of people with dementia in the population to increase.

25% There are a lot fewer patients on a dementia disease register than we would expect given the demographic of the practice population. For example, at Grosvenor Road surgery, around 70% of the estimated population with dementia are on the dementia disease register.
